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The series of exhibitions will be of interest to all those wanting to celebrate the University of New Haven's 100th birthday, as it has evolved over the years and inspires future generations of students to succeed. Every month the Library will commemorate the University's past from a unique perspective using memorabilia from our archival collection that will engage the entire community as if they had just opened a 'time capsule'.

In January 2020, we invite you to go back in time and witness the dramatic changes that have affected the campus over the years. Be immersed in the hopes, dreams, and experiences of students past and present and see the *Early History of University of New Haven* display, which illustrates the journey from the initial blueprints stage to concrete reality.

In February 2020, the *College of Business* display will show how the university's educational goals evolved to mirror the various changes in the economy leading to the current emphasis on STEM-certified business programs and analytics.

In March 2020, we spotlight the *Tagliatela College of Engineering* showing how this long-standing division has been preparing students since 1920 to become ethical trailblazers in their field of study thereby transforming our communities and the world through emerging technologies.

In April 2020, tribute will be paid to the much heralded *Henry C. Lee College of Criminal Justice and Forensic Sciences* whose success derives from marrying theory and practice in the fields of public safety and Law Enforcement via Experiential Learning. Forensic Sciences is a cornerstone area of study in the College along with Fire Science and National Security..

In May 2020, we show how the *School of Health Sciences* helps foster a career track that supports the well-being of others in a society becoming increasingly in need of Health Care solutions.

In June 2020, *Arts at the University of New Haven* will show how cultural enrichment has been essential to the life of the university. The Seton Gallery, Bucknall Theatre and the WNHU Radio Station all offer venues where creativity can flourish and foster learning experiences outside of the classroom that will challenge and improve the minds of society's future leaders.

In July – August 2020, the theme will be *Student Life on Campus* with a focus on revisiting participation in campus events and activities that have positively influenced the university community by allowing students to develop their extracurricular interests in a group setting (theatre, college newspaper, and sports). We reflect on *how Campus Organizations and Fraternities/Sororities* serve the student population and provide opportunities for success that run parallel to the curriculum.

In September 2020 if you did not join Dr. Henry Lee in Boca Raton for the Centennial Celebration Weekend, the library will honor our dedicated faculty by presenting *Faculty Publications* to illustrate the contributions our scholars and administrators have made to the campus community as a research institution.

In October 2020, *Athletics* will be showcased including the many sports and winning teams. As the University grew, so did our Athletics Department, an integral part of our history.

Graduate Student IT Workers Available in the Library

Did you know that the library has student IT workers available to help troubleshoot basic computer problems? The Marvin K. Peterson library employs four Graduate Student Workers, all with a background in Computer Science, to assist students with various computer issues, including but not limited to printing, scanning, copying, and downloading software. Need to print to the library printers from your laptop? Bring your laptop to the library and our student workers can help. Do you need assistance using Microsoft Office Suite (Word, Excel, or Powerpoint)? Student workers are located behind the library's main desk and are willing and able to help solve your computer problems. Because of their background in computer science, our student workers may be able to help troubleshoot other technical issues you encounter with your laptops. Graduate Student IT workers are available, beginning at 10am every day, Monday through Friday for 12 hours each day and on the weekends for 8 hours per day. Please bring your problems or questions and our student staff will be happy to help.

Librarian Collaboration Teaching Information Literacy Skills in UNIV 1141 and BUSA 1000

UNIV 1141 (Introduction to Academic Research and Project Management) and BUSA 1000 (Introduction to Business and Entrepreneurship) are required courses for all undergraduate students at the University of New Haven. These courses are usually taken in the first year. One very important aspect of these classes is that they help lay the foundation for future academic success by incorporating an information literacy lesson that is developed and conducted by a University of New Haven information literacy librarian. Information literacy skills are critical for success in these courses as well as later in many courses that they'll need to master throughout their academic career.

Information literacy is the ability to locate, evaluate and ethically use information. While information literacy competence is a skill that is developed over time, these courses begin to lay the foundation by introducing students to the information resources available to them through the university library. They are taught where to find the information sources, and equally if not more important, how to evaluate sources for usefulness, authority and credibility in backing up a claim. In the information literacy lesson taught by a librarian, students learn by doing hands on exercises to learn and reinforce the skills being taught, such as choosing an appropriate database and Boolean searching. They also need to be able to articulate why any particular information source was chosen and how it related to the problem they are trying to solve. As the class progresses, students need to use these skills when searching for information for their class project which is presented at a poster session at the end of the semester.

Through involvement in these courses, librarians reached over 1,600 students in the fall of 2019. The opportunity to reach so many students early in their academic career provided them with a solid foundation in information literacy that can be built upon as they progress through their studies here at the university.

Academic e-Book Collection from EBSCO offering more than 180,000 e-books

Have you ever needed a book about a topic, but haven't had time to stop by the library? Are you enrolled in or teaching an experiential learning course or internship that meets in another state or country? Are you enrolled in or teaching a hybrid or online course or in a hybrid or online degree program? Are you on a research sabbatical, but still need access to books for your research?

If you answered yes to any of these questions, the library is happy to say we have recently added a multidisciplinary new e-book database called the Academic e-book Collection by EBSCO that contains over 180,000 multidisciplinary e-books in a broad range of academic subjects. This database contains full text electronic books in just about any topic you can think of. All of the titles allow multiple people to read the e-book at the same time online through your computer or mobile device and take virtual notes. Each title generally allows you to print, email and download up to 100 pages, depending on the publishers licensing permissions. You may also be able to copy and paste the text you want to use directly into your paper and the citation will automatically be generated and pasted with the text.

You can search this collection through the EDS Search box or if you can access it directly by clicking on the e-books link from the library page in myCharger or by clicking on Academic e-book Collection from Annotated A-Z List, or the Alphabetical Listing of Databases or using the multidisciplinary subject from the Subject Listing.

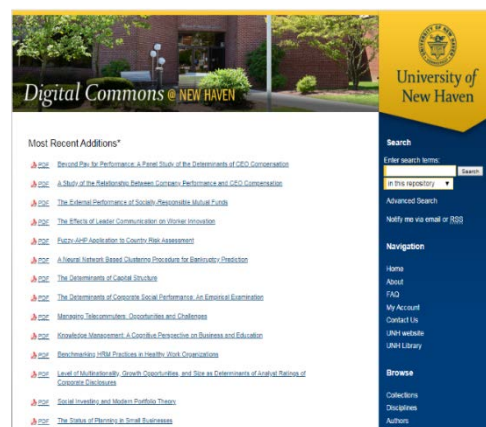
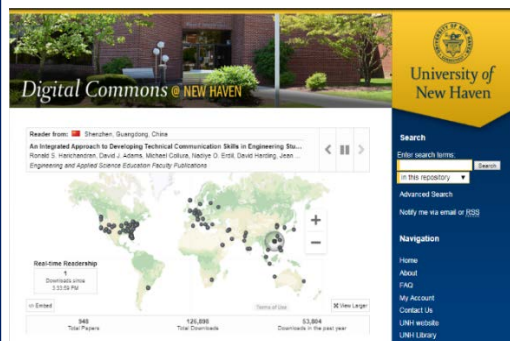
Career Development Center Peer Advisors

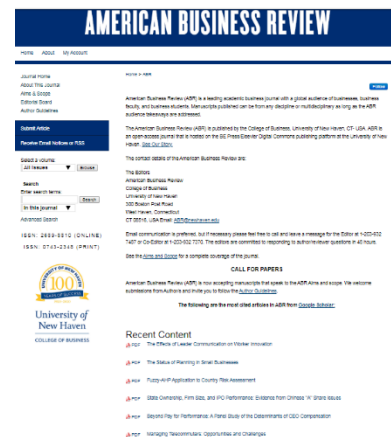

Library Study Rooms for Individuals as well as Groups



The library recently implemented a policy change that enables individual University of New Haven students to use the four (4) study rooms in the library that were formerly only available to groups of 2 or more students. This change recognizes the need for students to have an available space on campus for activities such as practicing presentations, participating in Skype calls or an interview and more. The rooms are equipped with technology for collaborative work and whiteboards. Students using the study rooms may charge out remote controls and marker bundles.

Reservations can be made in person at the

Circulation Desk or by telephone at (203) 932-7197. Students may use rooms for three (3) hour blocks of time. A valid University of New Haven ID must be presented and a reservation form will need to be filled out prior to using the room. If no other individual/group is waiting for a room, or has reserved the room, it may be renewed on an hourly basis from there. Please note that new individuals/groups take precedence.
